Wayne Corners has been serving as a Saturday Servant volunteer since 2018. With LASM's Saturday Servant program, Wayne attends monthly service dates to tackle home

maintenance and repair projects for older adult homeowners. He occasionally takes on oneperson projects in between service dates as well. Wayne and his wife Laurie have been residents of the Lindenwood Park Neighborhood for 20 years. When not volunteering with LASM, Wayne's hobbies include building furniture and musical instruments. He plays traditional Irish music for fun with friends. He plays the mandolin, bouzouki and has recently taken up the fiddle! We sat down with Wayne and asked him these questions:

How did you get connected with LASM and why do you choose to support LASM through volunteerism?

I was connected with LASM through my neighbor and LASM client, Colette Birkicht, who sadly passed away last June. I would help her with small tasks around her house. When I moved to Lindenwood Park there were many people in the neighborhood that were older and needed a little help to be able to stay in their homes. My wife, Laurie, and I would help our immediate neighbors, but LASM allowed us the ability to help others in the neighborhood that we hadn't met yet.

What do you enjoy most about volunteering as a Saturday Servant?

I like tinkering with things so when a request comes in to install a handrail or

fix a plumbing issue, I like the challenge. I try not to get in over my head and thankfully it hasn't happened yet! I also work in IT so I can help folks with technology issues.

What would you say to someone considering a volunteer position with LASM?

I'd say they should go for it. It's a great way to meet people in the neighborhood and Katie will even bring donuts every now and then.

What is your favorite thing about summertime?

I enjoy seeing friends a bit more often than I would otherwise but for the most part I look forward to summer being over. It's just too hot and humid here!

FROM OUR CASE MANAGER

QUESTION: The hot, humid summer in St. Louis is difficult for me and the increased air conditioning is hard on my pocketbook. Is there anything I can do?

ANSWER: To help our elders in need, EnergyCare will keep people safely cool by installing air conditioners in homes and lower their risk from life-threatening conditions. If you or someone you know is a low-income senior or disabled person and in need of a window A/C unit, please contact EnergyCare at 314-773-5900 to register for the program.

In addition to LIHEAP, there is an organization called Heat Up/Cool Down St. Louis that will help with utility cooling costs. The online application can be found at https://heatupstlouis.org or call the hotline at 314-241-0001. "Keeping Cool" through Ameren Missouri is another program that provides bill credits of \$25 per month through September for senior citizens or those who have a documented chronic medical condition. You must submit your application through a community action agency; call me to locate an agency near you. Program benefits last for two years. The income guidelines for Keeping Cool are up to 150% of the Federal Poverty Level, which is currently \$1,823 a month for a single person or \$2,465 for two people in a household.

Cooling Sites are also offered to the general public if an *Excessive Heat Advisory or Warning* is issued by the National Weather Service. Two nearby sites are Machecek and Buder branch public libraries, which provide airconditioned relief and cool water during the hottest part of the day.
